
# NC Violent Death Reporting System

## VIOLENT DEATH IN NORTH CAROLINA: CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT 9, 2022


• An estimated 771,994 North Carolina residents reside in Congressional District 9.

• In 2022, there were 208 violent deaths from injuries sustained by individuals living in Congressional District 9.

• The majority of decedents were residents of Cumberland (27.4%), Randolph (18.8%), and Alamance (17.3%) counties.



#### Manner of Death: Congressional District 9, NC\*



• There were 125 suicides (60.1%), 72 homicides (34.6%), two unintentional firearm deaths (1.0%), four deaths from legal intervention (1.9%) and five deaths of undetermined intent (2.4%).


• Firearms were involved in 71.2% of suicides and 79.2% of homicides.

• Among homicides caused by firearms, 80.7% were caused by handguns, 0% were caused by shotguns, and 7% were caused by rifles.

• Among suicides caused by firearms, 87.6% were caused by handguns, 7.9% were caused by shotguns, and 3.4% were caused by rifles.

• The second leading method of death for suicide was hanging, strangulation, or suffocation (16%).


#### **Firearms were involved in 74.1% of all homicide and suicide deaths** Method of Death: Congressional District 9, NC\*

The North Carolina Violent Death Reporting System (NC-VDRS) is a CDC-funded statewide surveillance system that collects detailed information on violent deaths that occur in North Carolina, including homicide, suicide, unintentional firearm deaths, legal intervention and deaths of undetermined intent. NC-VDRS triangulates information from death certificates, medical examiner reports, and law enforcement reports to understand and aid in the prevention of violent deaths. Data reported in this document are based on residential address of the victim and, instead of a rate, the ratio is reported. This document summarizes fatal injuries from violence that occurred in Congressional District 9 for the year 2022. Since not all deaths resulting from violence are able to be geocoded, the violent death numbers represented in this fact sheet may be slightly underestimated.

Manner of Death by Age Group: Congressional District 9, NC\*



 Suicides and homicides displayed different age patterns.

• However, both homicides and suicides peaked among those 25-34 with 23.6% of total homicides and 19.2% total suicides.


• Percentage of overall violent deaths peaked among those 25-34 at 21.2% of total violent deaths.

#### Males consistently have higher proportions of violent deaths than females


 The majority of suicide and homicide victims were male. There were 101 male suicide victims and 56 male homicide victims, which accounted for 80.8% and 77.8% of victims respectively.

 There were 24 female suicide victims and 16 female homicide victims, which accounted for 19.2% and 22.2% of victims respectively.



#### Uneven distributions are seen among race and manner of death

Manner of Death by Race: Congressional District 9, NC\*



 Patterns of suicide and homicide differed by race. 75.2% of suicide victims were Non-Hispanic (NH) White while only 12.0% were NH Black.

• In contrast, 63.9% of homicide victims were NH Black, and 22.2% were NH White.

• Overall, there were 20 (9.6%) Hispanic, 114 (54.8%) NH White, 66 (31.7%) NH Black, 4 (1.9%) NH American Indian, and 3 (1.4%) NH Asian victims.
